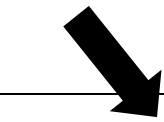

<p>The following elements are possible components that should be considered for Works Cited entries for non-periodical print sources. They should be arranged in the order presented below:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1- Name of the author, editor, compiler, or translator 2- <i>Title of the work</i> (in italics) 3- Edition used 4- Number(s) of the volumes used 5- City of publication, name of the publisher, and year of publication 6- Medium of publication consulted (Print/Web) 	<p>The following elements are possible components that should be considered for Works Cited entries for periodical print sources. They should be arranged in the order presented below:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1- Author's name 2- "Title of the article" (in quotations) 3- <i>Name of the periodical</i> (in italics) 4- Series number (if needed) 5- Volume number (for scholarly journals) 6- Issue # (if available for scholarly journals) 7- Date of publication 8- Page numbers 9- Medium of publication (Print/Web) <p>Note: if using a scholarly journal, the volume number .s separated from the issue number with a period and then the year appears in brackets. For example, 32.1 (2009)</p> <p>Note: If article appears on continuous pages, the pagination should be recorded as 23-28. If article appears on non-continuous pages (separated by advertisements), the pagination should be recorded as 23+. If there is no pagination available, write n. pag.</p>	<p>The following elements are possible components that should be considered for Works Cited entries for non-periodical print sources. They should be arranged in the order presented below:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1- Name of author, compiler, etc. 2- Title of work (italicized if work is independent, and in quotation marks without italics if work is part of a larger work) 3- Title of the overall website in italics (if distinct from #2 above) 4- Publisher or sponsor of the site (if not available use N.p.) 5- Date of publication (day, month, year -if unavailable use n.d.) 6- Medium of publication (Print/Web) 7- Date of access (day, month, year)



Provide web address (URL) unless teacher does not want it. It would be placed after the period following the date of access. Be sure to put < > around the URL and end the citation with a period.

A work in an anthology (ex. a poem or short story)	Last Name of author of the part of the book being cited, first name. “Title of the piece.” <i>Title of the Anthology</i> . Ed. Name of editor or compiler of the anthology. Place of publication: Name of publisher, year of publication. Page numbers of the entire piece cited (not just pages you used). Medium. Book by a corporate author	Name of the corporate author (leave out A, An, The). <i>Title of the work</i> . Place of publication: Name of publisher, year of publication. Medium. Encyclopaedia or dictionary (Hard copy) * reference book	Author’s Last name, first name (if given). “Title of the article.” <i>Title of the Book From Which it Came</i> . Edition date.
